- 33 She conceived again, and when she gave birth to a son she said, "Because the Lord heard that I am not loved, he gave me this one too." So she named him Simeon.
- 35 She conceived again, and when she gave birth to a son she said, "This time I will praise the Lord." So she named him Judah. Then she stopped having children.

⁴So Jacob sent word to Rachel and Leah to come out to the fields where his flocks were. ⁵He said to them, "I see that your father's attitude toward me is not what it was before, but the God of my father has been with me. ⁶You know that I've worked for your father with all my strength, ⁷yet your father has cheated me by changing my wages ten times. However, God has not allowed him to harm me. ⁸If he said, 'The speckled ones will be your wages,' then all the flocks gave birth to speckled young; and if he said, 'The streaked ones will be your wages,' then all the flocks bore streaked young. ⁹So God has taken away your father's livestock and has given them to me.

¹⁰ "In breeding season I once had a dream in which I looked up and saw that the male goats mating with the flock were streaked, speckled or spotted. ¹¹ The angel of God said to me in the dream, 'Jacob.' Not only has he sold us, but he has used up what was paid for us. ¹⁶ Surely all the wealth that God took away from our father belongs to us and our children. So do whatever God has told you."


The Christian Response to Manipulation

The Holy Spirit ignites a fierce source of power and counsel for Christians. It




THINGS GO THE WRONG WAY

What does this passage reveal about Rachel?

Can we see how far Rachel's jealousy has gone? Instead of relying on the Lord and trusting Him, she's now gone to the pagan use of a plant for fertility. This leads us to pause and look at the bigger picture here. Is it not an understatement to say, Life was not going the way Rachel planned?

Jealousy and Envy

Many times, when things do not go as we plan them, we get discontented with what the Lord has given us. We look at the world around us and feel as though we are missing out. That blessing of a new car next door. The cries of a new baby during a dedication at church. The promotion your co-worker got. We get jealous. Instead of praising the Lord for blessing, we start to think someone got our blessing. This is the seed of jealousy. When we are not thankful and content with what we have, the root of bitterness and jealousy take hold of our hearts. Lets us read the following scriptures about jealousy. "Envy is a negative feeling of desire centered on someone who has something that you do not."


On the other hand, jealousy is defined as:


"a feeling of resentment, bitterness, or hostility toward someone who has something that you don't."

I know they may seem like the same thing, but the truth is far more profound. Envy ignites a fire within us, rooted in the yearning for something someone else possesses. It's about that intense desire for the "thing." It could be an extraordinary quality or a remarkable achievement. This desire stirs our souls and compels us to reach for more.

However, jealousy ignites a fire within us, bringing a simmering intensity that involves a third party. It arises when one fears that their cherished possession is being endangered of being taken away or lost. This fear creates a storm of emotion that often rages through the realms of romance.

In order to fully understand these emotions, let's look at some examples from the Bible. First, let us look at envy.





This leads us to our current study. Rachel and Leah. I believe these women experienced both a severe case of Jealousy. Both of them thought they were going to loose something that had actually been given to them by God. As a result a competition was born and two other women were thrown into the mix. Now it came to Rachel selling her husband to Leah for a plant in hopes later she could conceive from the mystical idea this plant would make her fertile. In the meantime, it did not work and Leah had two more sons and a daughter.

What despair Rachel must have felt. Life was not going as planned. She was stuck in a dysfunctional family dynamic. She was forced to share a husband with her sister. She had grown to envy her sister and all she wanted was her happy ever after. Can you relate? Can you imagine her prayers to the Lord? Perhaps you have spoken similar prayers. *Lord, do you see me? Do you hear me?*

The Lord not only saw Rachel, he heard her, but His plan will always prevail against our own desires. He had a plan for Rachel. She would conceive a son. But not just any son.

Joseph

Not just any Joseph. But the Jospeh that would rise out of the chains of being sold by his brother into slavery. The Jospeh that would spend years in prison, falsely accused of rape. The same Jospeh that would interpret the Pharoah's dream of a coming famine, that would reach this very family and save them. From Joseph, the entire family would be saved and over 200 years that followed his life the nation of Isreal would be born. God had a wonderful purpose for both Leah and Rachel! While they were battling each other, the Lord remained patient, loving and poured Hs mercy and grace into these women.

No, life did not go as they had planned, but God had an even greater purpose that was greater than the dysfunction and circumstances of their lives.

Leah – gave birth to Judah and from Judah came the line that Jesus was born from. Rachel – gave birth to a son who would experience terrible things, but become a foreshadow of Christ!

Where are you at in life? Has life not gone as you planned? Is it perhaps the Lord calling you to a greater purpose? How does the story of Rachel's life "gone wrong" speak to you today?

The temptations you've pondered and the heavy costs they may entail are also unknown to me. Yet, the lives of this sister blaze a trail of inspiration. They remind us to wait patiently on the Lord. We are called to trust in His perfect timing and divine purposes.

28 And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.

Romans 8:28

Desiring what God wants for us lays down a solid foundation. It fuels the confidence we need to run the race with great vigor and determination!

THE TROUBLED AND SORROWFUL

Rachel faces a troubled family situation. It includes a deceitful father-in-law and devious husband. However, she does have her heart's desire for a time—a family with children and security. It is not hard to see that this family, on personal levels, experienced a lot of sorrow and trouble. There is no guarantee of a trouble-free life if you choose to be surrendered to God. Life will not be without sorrows. It is the storms of trouble and sorrow that the Lord meets us. He may part the Red Sea or He may lead you through it. No matter what His will is, He is going to be there if we choose to seek Him. What we need to realize is this is a moment the Lord allows because He has already equipped us to walk through it.

Listen to what James has to say about troubles and tribulations:

2 Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, 3 because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. 4 Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything.

[James 1:2-4]

Joy in testing? The testing of our faith produced perseverance. What does this mean?

Trials and testing are an exhilarating part of life! Clinical trials lead groundbreaking discoveries. They ensure the safety of medications. These medications can change lives due to their effectiveness. Academic tests are valuable tools. They guide both teachers and students to uncover the areas that need strengthening. This process ignites a spark of improvement. Similarly, God uses

trials and difficult times to test our faith and develop spiritual maturity. As we experience trials and testing, we develop patient endurance. We become steadfast in our belief in God.

James boldly states that believers should be joyful. He encourages them to consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds. This is because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. This is quite a remarkable admonition.

Valuing times of trials and testing with sheer joy is no small feat! We often find ourselves entangled in our pain and disappointment. However, this scripture fervently urges us to pivot our gaze from our discomfort and suffering. We should focus on the profound benefits of perseverance. The trials mentioned in this passage spring from the Greek word "*peirasmos*." They represent an exhilarating adventure of experiment. It involves attempt, trial, and proving. The NAS New Testament Greek Lexicon passionately conveys that these times of testing serve as a trial of man's fidelity. They test integrity, virtue, and constancy.

Trials can also include "an enticement to sin, temptation, whether arising from the desires or from the outward circumstances." A trial can be a time of adversity and affliction. It tests or proves one's character, faith, and holiness. James 1:3 includes the Greek word "dokimion" often translated "testing" and is related to proving genuineness and goodness.



Why Do Christians Face Trials and Temptations?

Challenging times ignite the fire of our true character and expose the depths of our hearts. Just as a student embraces the rigors of tests, a Christian must bravely confront trials and temptations. We often perceive temptations as moral dilemmas and trials as physical obstacles. Yet, within the sacred pages of the Bible, both are powerful instruments. They are designed to refine our faith. They demonstrate our unwavering obedience.

1 Peter 1:6 ignites a powerful call for believers to rejoice, even during trials. If necessary, you have been grieved by various trials for a little while. Our human understanding of a "little while" often pales in comparison to God's grand, eternal timeline. The journey of pharmaceutical trials unfolds over countless years before a new medicine can bless the world. The courtroom drama of a jury trial consumes weeks of anticipation. Similarly, our spiritual trials and tests have their unique beginnings and ends. Whether that period stretches to 40 days or even 40 years, each moment serves a divine purpose!

Reading the Bible ignites a powerful understanding of God's divine timing and purpose, especially during our most challenging moments. Just consider the profound trial Jesus faced when tested by Satan. This occurred after he endured 40 grueling days in the wilderness. This event is vividly detailed in Matthew 4:1-11. Let's Look at other tests of faith:

- Jesus was tested by the Pharisees on multiple occasions (John 8:2-11; Matthew 22:15-22)
- Abraham was tested at Mt. Moriah (Genesis 22)
- Joseph was tempted by Potiphar's wife (Genesis 39:6-20)

Trials and temptations are integral to the vibrant tapestry of the Christian journey. It's only natural to fervently ponder, "From where do these tests and trials emerge?"

Does God Tempt People?

God does not tempt us. However, He permits temptation to enter our lives. These trials unveil the true condition of our hearts. They beckon us closer to Christ. In James 1:13-14, we find a powerful answer to the question, "Does God tempt people?" It declares boldly, "When tempted, no one should say, 'God is tempting me.' For God cannot be tempted by evil. Nor does he tempt anyone. Each person is tempted when they are dragged away by their own evil desire and enticed." This truth ignites a fire within us. It urges us to recognize our struggles as opportunities for growth. We find a deeper connection with the divine.

In Job 1, God gave permission for Satan to test Job's character. In Luke 22:31, Jesus tells Simon Peter that Satan demanded to sift him like wheat. Satan

approached Jesus with three distinct temptations in Matthew 4:1-11, each one a fierce trial! Yet, it's crucial to understand that temptations do not inherently lead to sin. Despite being tempted in every conceivable way (Hebrews 4:15), Jesus emerged unscathed. There was no trace of sin in him (1 John 3:5). His victory over


temptation stands as a powerful testament to his divine nature!

16 They sent their disciples to him along with the Herodians. "Teacher," they said, "we know that you are a man of integrity and that you teach the way of God in accordance with the truth. You aren't swayed by others, because you pay no attention to who they are.

Not all people in the Bible passed the tests during times of temptation. Let's look at scripture about those who failed the tests.

- Adam and Eve gave into temptation in the Garden of Eden in Genesis 3
- The Israelites did not pass the tests in the wilderness at Massah and Meribah in Exodus 17:7
- Simon Peter denied Christ three times in Luke 22:54-62




People wrestle fiercely with their own desires and the seductive pull of sin. Satan tempted Jesus cruelly after a grueling 40-day fast. He used the allure of food and worldly acclaim as temptation. We find ourselves lured in our most vulnerable moments. Yet, giving in to our pride, unrighteousness, and selfish cravings can lead us down treacherous paths filled with regret. Trials compel us to address the spiritual gaps in our lives. These gaps are much like misunderstandings of derivatives exposed by a challenging calculus exam. In the same way, times of testing unearth weaknesses in our faith. They also reveal our misunderstanding of God's magnificent character.

2 Remember how the Lord your God led you all the way in the wilderness these forty years, to humble and test you in order to know what was in your heart, whether or not you would keep his commands.

Deuteronomy 8:2

God allows us to endure the fiery trials of life. These trials forge our faith. They refine our character in the heat of adversity. The Apostle Peter draws from his profound personal experiences. He passionately ties these trials to the integrity of our faith. They are linked to the authenticity of our beliefs. In 1 Peter 1:7, he beautifully reveals that the various challenges believers encounter serve to unveil the genuine quality of their faith, which is more precious than gold. Gold perishes though it is tested by fire. Their faith may emerge to bring forth resounding praise,



glory, and honor at the glorious revelation of Jesus Christ.

Tests reveal the depths of our knowledge. They also show the vast expanse of what remains for us to explore. Even in the face of failure, there are invaluable lessons to be gained. During these times of trial and testing, we are shielded from succumbing to pride. We learn instead to extend grace to others navigating their own struggles. Embracing trials and temptations enriches our capacity. By doing so, we can minister compassionately to those in affliction. This shapes us more closely into the image of Christ (2 Corinthians 1:3-6).

How Can We Have Joy When We Face Trials of Many Kinds?

Trials and temptations are not mere obstacles; they are powerful tests that refine our faith and yield extraordinary blessings. As James 1:12 proclaims, "Blessed is the one who perseveres under trial. Having stood the test, that person will receive the crown of life. The Lord has promised this crown to those who love him." This crown of life is not just any royal insignia. It symbolizes the glorious laurels bestowed upon a valiant victor. These laurels are received after a fierce battle. The triumphant one, adorned with this crown, is a beacon of honor. They are celebrated and recognized for their unwavering spirit and determination.

After enduring the fires of trial and temptation, we emerge transformed, reflecting the very essence of Christ. 2 Corinthians 1:6 fervently declares, "For as we share abundantly in Christ's sufferings, we also share abundantly in comfort


through Christ." Much like the overwhelming joy that surges forth after conquering a marathon, embrace and share in Christ's sufferings. You will undeniably witness His radiant glory!

As 1 Peter 4:12-13 passionately declares, "Beloved, do not be taken aback by the fiery trials that descend upon you. These trials test your spirit as if something unfamiliar were occurring. Instead, embrace the challenge. Rejoice fervently as you partake in Christ's sufferings. You will also exult and be filled with joy when His magnificent glory is unveiled!"

What Does the Bible Say about Trials and Perseverance?

Times of testing ignite within us an unshakeable steadfastness, fierce perseverance, and incredible endurance (James 1:3). In our darkest moments, we will embody the unwavering spirit of Jesus. He endured the cross "for the joy that was set before him" (Hebrews 12:2). Steadfastness mirrors the very character of Christ (2 Thessalonians 3:5; Revelation 1:9). It reminds us that true strength is forged through adversity. Our relentless perseverance leads us to completeness. It matures us into the individuals we are destined to be (James 1:4).

We are destined to experience the magnificent fruit of the Holy Spirit in our lives. It is brimming with peace, joy, and unwavering patience! Romans 5:3-4 passionately reveals that tribulation serves as a catalyst for cultivating patience in the hearts of believers. Patience, a glorious fruit of the Holy Spirit, reflects the very character of God (2 Peter 3:9). We are to rejoice in our suffering because it produces


God's Covenant to Abraham




magnificent plan just for you. You are not being overlooked; you are being fiercely protected. You are not being dismissed; God ardently has your best interests at heart.

The circumstances of Rachel's life play a large part in God's plan for His people. Joseph was the second to youngest of the 12 sons. He was hated by his brothers because his father favored him. He was eventually sold into slavery. He was sold to Potipher and God blessed his work and elevated him to running Potipher's entire house. But evil lurked in the shadows. When Potipher's wife was rejected by Joseph, she accused him of rape and he was thrown in prison. But God. God was not finished with him. In prison he interpreted dreams of servants who worked for the Pharoah.



Later one of the servants would reveal that Jospeh could interpret the Pharoah's dream. God elevated Jospeh again to be second in command over all of Egypt.

A mighty famine came to the all lands and because Jospeh helped prepare all nations, without knowing it he saved his own family who came to Egypt to buy food. While this is the short version, the story has many complexities, but we learn that God is a God who can not be tried for neglect and abandonment of His children! While This son was an answer of prayer to Rachel, God saw the bigger picture. He looked down the sands of time and had great purpose for Jospeh.

11 For I know the plans I have for you" – this is the Lord's declaration – "plans for your well-being, not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope.

Jeremiah 29:11

God had a plan for Rachel's life. God has a plan for your life that not only deals with right now, but stretches to a future that has not come yet. Your obedience in waiting today, might be the change or the rescue other need down the road. Wait patiently. God has plans to prosper you!

As we close out this study of Rachel, take the time to reflect upon her story and life. What is God speaking to you about your own life, circumstances, and walk with Him? IS there a promise you are struggling to believe? Take time today to sit with Him and allow Him to lead you through revealing His Word to you.







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
