

Walk the Walk, Talk the Talk

Titus 1:15-16

Despite their façade of righteousness, they engaged in acts of piety – giving alms, praying, and fasting. They did this solely to bask in the admiration of others, rather than from a sincere heart of devotion. Furthermore, some proclaimed the gospel not to share Christ's love. They did it for personal gain or to sow discord among believers. This stark contrast serves as a haunting reminder of the true essence of faith and the dangers of superficial appearances.

Giving Alms, Praying, and Fasting: In a stirring rebuke, Jesus highlights the misguided hearts of the Pharisees! Focused on Values and Beliefs:

- Do motives align with core values and beliefs?
- What principles guide decisions?
- Are actions consistent with the desired character?
- What matters most, and does the action reflect that?

Focused on Impact on Others:

- How will a decision or action affect others?
- Are others treated fairly, and are their rights respected?
- Does the action cause harm to the self or others?
- Is there concern about the impact of actions on others' faith or beliefs?

Focused on Higher Purpose or Spiritual Alignment:

- Is God glorified by the action?
- Is there a willingness to fulfill God's requests, even if they seem insignificant?
- Is the primary motivation to please God?
- Is there an effort to align the heart and actions with God's purpose?

Focused on Authenticity and Sincerity:

- Is the heart truly in what is being done?
- Is the action performed with sincerity, without a hidden agenda?
- Do the words match the heart?

Reflecting on Outcomes:

- Will the action stop if others misunderstand or criticize it?
- Will service continue even if those served do not show gratitude?



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
