The Genealogies of Jesus listed in Matthew 1 and Luke 3 showcase towering biblical figures. These figures paint a vibrant portrait that resonates through the ages. This family tree includes revered kings like David, Solomon, and Josiah. It also features extraordinary pillars of faith like Noah and Boaz. This family tree bursts with the vitality of divine legacy. Yet, overshadowing them all, no name shines more significant than that of Abraham. His unwavering faith ignited a covenant that changed humanity forever.

Abraham is called the father of faith, patriarch of the people of Israel, the friend of God...

It all began in Genesis 12. This pivotal moment occurred when God called upon a man named Abram. Abram was a remarkable descendant of Noah through Shem. God urged him to leave his homeland and embark on a journey to a divinely chosen land (Genesis 12:1). With this life-altering command came an extraordinary promise: "I will make you a great nation... all families will be blessed through you" (Genesis 12:2-3). At the vibrant age of 75, Abraham embraced the call of the Lord with an open heart. What captivates us in this incredible narrative is that, at this juncture, Abram and Sari were childless. How could God possibly forge a great nation from two elderly individuals without

Genesis 15:5

Despite the seemingly impossible situation, Abram believed and God counted Him righteous because of his faith (James 2:23). And guess what? A few many years later, Sari gave birth to Isaac. Isaac was the son of promise. Isaac went on to become the clearest picture of God's plan. God instructed Abraham to take Isaac up the mountain and sacrifice him (Gen 22). Without hesitation, Abraham took his only son, a promised son up the mountain.

This is where we see the true nature of faith: it does not demand explanations but instead rests on promises. Abraham knew God could not contradict Himself. Abraham trusted God had a plan. He was old enough to know what was going on and to carry his own wood for his own sacrifice. Isaac remained silent as his father tied him to the alter. He did not protest. He was willingly going to give himself up...just like Jesus!

In the end, the Lord stayed Abraham's hand and provided another sacrifice. He kept His promise and gave us a glimpse of what was to come.

³² He did not even spare his own Son but gave him up for us all. How will he not also with him grant us everything?



⁸ Before the men fell asleep, she went up on the roof ⁹ and said to them, "I know that the Lord has given you this land and that the terror of you has fallen on us, and everyone who lives in the land is panicking because of you. ¹⁰ For we have heard how the Lord dried up the water of the Red Sea before you when you came out of Egypt, and what you did to Sihon and Og, the two Amorite kings you completely destroyed across the Jordan. ¹¹ When we heard this, we lost heart, and everyone's courage failed because of you, for the Lord your God is God in heaven above and on earth below.

Joshua 2:8-11

News spread fast about this "mob" traveling in the wilderness. These people's God had destroyed Egypt and parted the Red Sea for them to safely get away from the Pharoah's army. This same God allowed them to destroy the Amorite kings before crossing the Jordan. Then, they watched with their own eyes as this same God pushed the waters back of the Jordan and this "mob" crossed over.

In the pages of 2 Samuel, we uncover the greatest promise ever given to David. It is a testament to his unshakeable faith and the divine plan set in motion.

David yearned to construct a magnificent temple for the Lord—a majestic house where the Divine could reside among His people. Yet, the Almighty had a different vision. Why, you ask? God revealed to David that the weight of blood stained his hands. This disqualified him from building a sanctuary for the Most High. However, from the lineage of David, the Lord made an extraordinary promise. Through his very seed, He vowed to establish an everlasting kingdom. This kingdom would endure through Eternity.

"The Lord declares to you: The Lord himself will make a house for you. ¹² When your time comes and you rest with your ancestors, I will raise up after you your descendant, who will come from your body, and I will establish his kingdom. ¹³ He is the one who will build a house for my name, and I will establish the throne of his kingdom forever. ¹⁴ I will be his father, and he will be my son. When he does wrong, I will discipline him with a rod of men and blows from mortals. ¹⁵ But my faithful love will never leave him as it did when I removed it from Saul, whom I removed from before you. ¹⁶ Your house and kingdom will endure before me forever, and your throne will be established forever.'"

2 Samuel 7:12-16

Joseph is mentioned because he is Jesus' earthy father and genealogy only mentions males. We can go as far as to say that Jesus was twice from David's line.

Of course, Jesus elevated David's rule to a breathtaking pinnacle! He is not just any fleeting king like those who came before. He is the King of kings and the Lord of lords (Revelation 19:16)! Christ's kingdom stretches across the entire universe, for all things were crafted by Him and for Him (Colossians 1:16)! Since He has conquered death and risen again, His reign will NEVER end (Romans 6:9)!

Through the breathtaking and glorious realities of who Jesus is and what He has accomplished, the awe-inspiring promise to David has been triumphantly fulfilled! David's throne stands unshakably established for all eternity. His divine power has been magnificently passed down through the generations to the eternal Christ! No earthly legacy, no matter how grand, can even begin to compare with this extraordinary truth!

What promises of God do you rest on? How have you seen these fulfilled in your life? Today we reflect upon Philippians 4:19:

not merely based on your actions or merits, but on God's grace and love?


2. Reflecting on the application in your life

Do you remember what you were dong at the age of 8?

I barely remember most of my childhood, but I remember having a bike. That bike was my freedom from a dysfunctional home. I would carry me miles away from the violence, even if it was just simply riding in the same circles around the driveway. What about you? Whatever we were doing, a young 8 year old boy had us all beat.

22 Josiah was eight years old when he became king, and he reigned thirty-one years in Jerusalem. His mother's name was Jedidah the daughter of Adaiah; she was from Bozkath. ² He did what was right in the Lord's sight and walked in all the ways of his ancestor David; he did not turn to the right or the left.

2 Kings 22:1-2

That's right! An 8-year-old boy, a descendant of David, had courageously ascended the throne of Israel. He hadn't even reached his Bar Mitzvah yet! What is even more awe-inspiring is that he was one of the rare few in Israel. His heart truly chased after the Lord.

His reign emerged from the ashes of long-neglected kingdoms, igniting a fervent spirit for restoration. A monumental task lay ahead. It all began with the sacred

act of rebuilding the temple. The temple had fallen into disrepair. With unwavering resolve, Josiah championed a transformative program to restore the temple to its former glory. This remarkable young man stands as one of the most pivotal kings to have governed God's chosen people. He led dynamically. Through his leadership, a powerful revival swept through the land. The hearts of the people turned passionately back to the Lord. His reign, by all accounts, shone brightly with success. Yet, as we delve deeper, we see that his political legacy was not just a series of achievements. It was a profound testament to his remarkable character.

The workmen fervently began to excavate the debris of the ancient temple. They stumbled upon a treasure profoundly vital to the people. It was indispensable. What revelation awaited them? What profound legacy had been forsaken amidst the ruins? A copy of the sacred scriptures! As the life-giving Word of God was unveiled, Josiah's heart was gripped with a powerful realization. He understood how tragically astray he and his people had wandered from the Lord (2 Kings 22).

Once this mindset permeates a person's self-image, its grip becomes unyielding. It whirls endlessly like a warped merry-go-round, trapping us in its cycle. These two simple words have stifled the advancement of God's mighty work more than we could ever conceive. The staggering truth is that this doesn't have to be our reality if we embrace the truth. Do you understand what triumphs over "if only..."?

"But God..."

No matter how inadequate or inept we may feel about ourselves, when the Lord calls us to specific tasks, He passionately ensures they are completed. The lives of Joseph and Mary provide a vivid illustration of this profound spiritual truth. In hindsight, it can be all too easy for us to breeze past their incredible story.

We long to leap over the preliminary preparations and dive straight into the miraculous birth of Jesus. Yet, in our haste, we often overlook the profound sense of inadequacy that surely plagued these two remarkable individuals. Can you fathom the weight of being entrusted with the care and upbringing of the Savior of the world? What an awe-inspiring yet daunting responsibility! In their very human hearts, this must have stirred immense pressure and anxiety. At some point, they must have felt overwhelmed and inept, grappling with the monumental task assigned to them.

This was an ordinary Jewish couple living within the constraints of modest means. They barely scraped by, their lives defined by struggle and perseverance. Yet, amidst their challenges, they were chosen to bear the incredible calling of being Christ's parents. This destiny would require them to undertake a daunting journey. They would face obstacles that many first-time parents could hardly I magine. If we can't hear the "If only..." softly resonating in the deepest corners of their souls, we aren't truly paying attention.

"But God..."

God knows all things and is all-powerful. He would take this couple of humble means. He used them to turn the tide of human history in astonishing ways. Everything was the breathtaking outcome of their willingness to participate. The Lord had magnificent plans in store for them. He would equip them for the unprecedented calling placed on their lives. They didn't need to transform into someone else. They just had to wholeheartedly follow the directions given to them. And that's exactly what they did!

The application for our lives couldn't be more profound! Joseph and Mary powerfully illustrate that God desires to use our lives in extraordinary ways. This desire far surpasses our own feelings of inadequacy. When He calls upon us, our human nature often clings to thoughts of "If only..." This thought makes us believe we lack the ability to obey. It becomes an excuse that stops us from

fulfilling His great commission.
But that is also where Joseph and Mary powerfully remind us. They demonstrate the profound truth that it's not about "If only" but rather "But God!" We can courageously exchange our default feelings of inadequacy for unwavering trust in the Lord's boundless sufficiency. When we do this, there truly is no limit to what we can achieve through Him. We can fulfill every divine calling God places on our lives just like the extraordinary examples set by Joseph and Mary.

Humanity's inherent inadequacy

...God's sufficiency and grace

The Bible teaches that humans are inherently inadequate and depend entirely on God for existence and salvation. This is evident throughout scripture:

1. Our fallen state

- The fall of Adam and Eve in Genesis 3 illustrates the inherent weakness and susceptibility to sin in humanity, even in a state of perfection.
- Isaiah 64:6 describes righteous acts as "filthy rags," emphasizing the insufficiency of human righteousness and the need for divine intervention.
- Romans 3:12 states that all have turned aside and become worthless, and no one does good, not even one.
- Romans 6:23 emphasizes that the wages of sin is death, highlighting the inability of humans to save themselves.

2. Our dependence on God

 - * Proverbs 3:5 encourages trust in the Lord with all your heart, rather than leaning on your own understanding.
- **Purpose and meaning:** Lives find meaning and purpose in serving God and fulfilling His will. "The Bible affirms repeatedly that all human life is valuable, a claim grounded in humanity's creation by God in his image and likeness (Gen 1:26–27, 9:6)".

3. Biblical examples

- Moses: Moses expressed his inadequacy when called by God to lead the Israelites, but God assured him of His presence and sufficiency.
- **Gideon:** Gideon felt inadequate and weak, but God empowered him beyond his natural capabilities to deliver Israel.

How can I challenge my perception of my own adequacies in light of God's Word?

You have the incredible opportunity to confront your perception of your own worthiness. Redefine it by aligning with the divine perspective of God. Embrace humility wholeheartedly and fervently seek a deeper reliance on Him. Here are powerful and practical ways to embark on this transformative journey:

1. Daily Scripture meditation

- Start your day by reading God's word and allowing His truths to reshape your thoughts and perceptions about yourself.
- Choose scriptures that speak to your worth in Christ, such as 1 Peter 2:9, which calls believers "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession", and Ephesians 2:10, which identifies believers as God's "handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do",.
- Meditate on these verses throughout the day, letting them sink into your heart and mind.

- Remember the apostle Paul's statement in 2 Corinthians 12:9-10, where he boasts in his weaknesses so that the power of Christ may rest upon him.


Depend on God's sufficiency

Searching.

Some people spend their whole lives searching. They are searching for the perfect job, perfect life partner, perfect house, perfect car, perfect town, perfect friends, perfect church...

They search and search, yet often times discover that it is not easy to find what they are looking for. Sometimes, the searches take us far from home, across the country or even world. It takes us to new and unfamiliar territory.

The wisemen were in search of a king. Not just any king, but the King.

Who were these men who bravely travel from the East?

They are referred to often as a group of "wise men." They were likely Persian or Babylonian ("the East") priests. These priests were astrologers who devoted their time to interpreting signs and prophecies. What an "odd" group of people. I mean think about it. God using pagan astrologist and priests? Let us dive into the details!

600 years prior to this event, Daniel had great influence on the government of Babylon and Persia. I wished we had time to explore all of Daniel's story, but I encourage you to study him! He actually taught the priests and "wise men" of his day, detailed prophecies of the coming King (Daniel 9:24-26). He taught them Hebrew scriptures and a large number of Jews actually maintained a presence in the area after their return from exile. It makes sense that these magi would look to the Scriptures for great signs and miracles.

What I find significant and fascinating is that for 600 years they kept looking! This was not a new fresh thing to them. For 6 centuries they looked for the sign the King was coming. A number of scholars believe the wisemen knew to look for the star because of the reference made in Numbers 24:17:

¹⁷ I see him, but not now; I perceive him, but not near. A star will come from Jacob, and a scepter will arise from Israel. He will smash the forehead of Moab and strike down all the Shethites

Numbers 24:17

Did they believe the God of Abraham was the true God? It s very possible. Many events occurred during the time of Daniel. These events range from the great dreams of Nebuchadnezzar to the fiery furnace and the lion's den. It is very likely that a pocket of Babylonian and Persian priests and scholars had been converted. They likely passed down this prophecy from generation to generation.

These wise men had devoted their lives to finding the King. Consider that these men, who knew to look for the star as a sign of the Messiah's coming, were gentiles. Gentiles who had trusted the Word of God as truth. They trusted it so much. They left their homeland. They embarked on a long journey in search of the promised King and Messiah. They sought Him in faith and with all their hearts. When they found Him, they were filled with great joy at all His humble splendor.

Everyone's journey is different. Sometimes the journey is smooth and stead with minimal traffic. Sometimes it's rough, filled with speed bumps, detours, twists, and turns. Sadly, many people search their entre lives without finding the truth. But if their is one thing that we all have in common, it is that our journey will end.

The big questions is where? For those who seek the King and find Him, find eternal life along the way. We should embrace the passion and enthusiasm as the wise men who fervently sought the King and offered Him the most precious gifts they had. You can offer the most precious thing you have - your life.

Evaluating life goals through a biblical lens

2. Check your motives and intentions



For a brief but exhilarating chapter of my life, I dove headfirst into the electrifying world of football drafting for a fantasy football team. Despite my initial ignorance of the sport—only grasping the fundamentals of how the game is played—I found myself captivated. Player stats were a mystery to me, and I couldn't identify the stars from the shadows. Yet, the very concept of sports drafts fascinated me! These events aren't just bureaucratic formalities; they represent the thrilling moment when college athletes transition to the pros. How each team decides who to select is a tantalizing puzzle, leaving me in awe. Just imagine the tension for players already on the roster. They know that a fresh talent is about to be drafted. A potential contender could very well take their place!

What is my point? It must be an utterly overwhelming experience. It is brimming with discomfort and anxiety. There is the heavy burden of impending change. This occurs when your potential replacement steps into the spotlight. Some gracefully surrender their power, nobly passing the torch, while others fight tooth and nail, howling in defiance. This tumultuous battle reverberates throughout history, powerfully illustrated in the tale of King Herod the Great. The gospel reveals that when the wise men arrived, proclaiming the arrival of the "newborn King of the Jews," Herod was not just troubled. He was unmoored and shaken to his very essence.

Imagine yourself in his shoes. You are strolling along. You are enveloped in a world where every desire is fulfilled. Freedom reigns and ambition knows no bounds. You are the sovereign of Israel. You bask in the glory of your reign. Suddenly, a pair of men on camels appears on the horizon. They seek the King—but not you. Your successor has arrived. In that moment, a whirlwind of emotion rushes through you. It ignites a fierce passion for what is "rightfully yours."

I can't help but wonder about your perspective, but let's face it—honesty is crucial. In my own moment of selfishness, a deep worry about my current standing begins to churn within me. There's a powerful quote that echoes in my mind from *Star Wars Episode III: Revenge of the Sith*, where Chancellor Palpatine reveals a stark truth to young Anakin Skywalker: "All who gain power are afraid of losing it."

For the most part, humanity has undeniably demonstrated this truth. Herod was no exception. The Greek term for "troubled" in this context is etarachthe. This word evokes a profound sense of disturbance, anxiety, and terror. It stirs up a whirlwind of inner turmoil and emotional agitation. One grapples with overwhelming feelings that churn intensely from within.

In short, he was consumed by the dread of losing his power. The thought of losing his opulent palace tormented him. He feared losing all the comforts that came with his rule. The thought of relinquishing "his" kingdom ignited a fierce anxiety within him. He had seized this throne through force with the ruthless aid of the Romans. It is no surprise that he feared its potential loss. His worst fears were confirmed; whispers of a newborn savior sent chills down his spine. No sane person would undertake a perilous journey unless driven by undeniable truth. Herod knew the people's belief in this child as the promised Messiah would ignite their fervor. People would rally to rise against him. They would strip him of his crown. Yes, he was not merely troubled—he was gripped by sheer terror.

But Matthew then records something else that was interesting. Did you catch it?

³ When King Herod heard this, he was deeply disturbed, and all Jerusalem with him.

Matthew 2:3 (Bold for emphasis)

The people were just as deeply disturbed. Why?

They were afraid of the tyranny and horrors that Harod could inflict on the people to find this "newborn" and make sure He would never see the crown on his head. And they were right and justified in their fear. Just keep reading Matthew 2.

¹⁶ Then Herod, when he realized that he had been outwitted by the wise men, flew into a rage. He gave orders to massacre all the boys in and around Bethlehem who were two years old and under, in keeping with the time he had learned from the wise men. ¹⁷ Then what was spoken through Jeremiah the prophet was fulfilled:

¹⁸ A voice was heard in Ramah,

weeping, and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children; and she refused to be consoled, because they are no more.

Matthew 2:16-18

Harod did was is unthinkable. He did what s known as the massacre of the innocents.

What lesson can we learn here?

Fear can drive us to sin, compelling us to obstruct God's divine plan. This trepidation often results in suffering and pain, not just for ourselves, but for those we care about. Just as it ensnared Jonah and impacted Abraham and Sarah, we too can fall into this trap! Do not let this fate befall you! Cast aside those temporal, worldly distractions—they serve only to bring you trouble and heartache. Embrace faith and step boldly into the light of God's purpose!

3. Confront fear with faith



⁴ So he assembled all the chief priests and scribes of the people and asked them where the Messiah would be born.

Matthew 2:4

The arrival of the wise men sent shockwaves through King Herod the Great! He was driven by fear and intrigue. He summoned his own wise men, the scribes, and the chief priests of Israel. He was desperate for answers. He gathered his trusted advisors. He demanded they unveil the mystery unfolding before him. He urged them to enlighten him on the extraordinary events that were transpiring.

Why would he ask them where the Messiah was to be born?

Theologians suggest that he wanted to get information on the place so that he could end the life of the Messiah and put his own mind at ease. I think this is why we should never judge someone because of their position. You would think the king of Israel would have grown up in a house that was spiritually strong and studied the prophesies. You would think someone who called themselves "the Great" would know these things. In his own arrogance and foolishness, power was his goal. He did, after all become king with the help of Rome.

Harod's men answered, "In Bethlehem of Judea." And then they quote the prophet Micah:

⁶ And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah:
Because out of you will come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel."

² Bethlehem Ephrathah, you are small among the clans of Judah; one will come from you to be ruler over Israel for me. His origin is from antiquity, from ancient times.

Matthew 2:6

Micah 5:2

One thought seems to focus my mind: God's Perspective is different than ours.

These verses proclaim that Bethlehem, though small, may seem insignificant from a human perspective. It may appear youthful compared to the thousands within the clans of Judah. Yet, it was in this humble town that God made an astonishing choice. This was the sacred destination for the most monumental moment in all of history — past, present, and future.

Why? Would it not have stirred the hearts of many to believe in Jesus as the Messiah if He had been born in a grander setting? Perhaps His birth in the holy city of Jerusalem would have had a greater impact. If He was destined to reign on David's majestic throne, it would have made more sense for Him to emerge from the very heart of the Jewish nation. Imagine if He had come forth in a powerful Roman city. He could have established His everlasting rule there. He would have stood as the great rock that shatters the kingdoms of men at His feet (Daniel 2)!

No! God deliberately chose the most humble woman and the smallest city for His magnificent entrance into creation. What a profound lesson lies in this choice! From the dawn of humanity, God has been imparting this truth, echoing through time since the very creation of man.

Consider God's revelation to Elijah.

¹² After the earthquake there was a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire. And after the fire there was a voice, a soft whisper.

1 Kings 19:12

Elijah was eagerly waiting for the Lord to reveal His voice. He was not found in the thundering winds or the raging flames. Instead, He emerged in a gentle, whispering breeze that caressed the soul. No earthquake or fire heralded His presence, but a soft, tranquil breath that spoke volumes of love. God cherishes the humble, using them to create mighty waves of change. He elevates the humble. A humble heart recognizes that every achievement shines in the light of God's glory. Every success and triumph is dedicated wholly to His service. A humble heart doesn't yearn for self-glorification. It seeks to exalt God. All honor, glory, and praise truly belong to Him.

So, God chose to reestablish the line of David. It was once a majestic tree but was reduced to a mere stump. It was humbled beyond measure in the heart of the City of David. The birth of the King, destined for an everlasting reign, would not be heralded by trumpets, harps, or cymbals. Instead, it would unfold amidst the humble presence of livestock and the soft rustle of hay. In this divine simplicity, there lies a profound beauty—God could not have envisioned it any other way!

Man measures by outward appearances, yet God peers into the depths of our souls. The Jews failed to recognize and embrace Jesus as their King. He arrived not in glory but in humility. He embodied true servanthood. He entered Jerusalem on a lowly donkey, proclaiming that the first shall be last and the last shall be first. They longed for regal garments and a lavish crown. Instead, they encountered robes of righteousness. They also encountered a crown of thorns, which was an ineffable testament to His love and sacrifice.

God chose to accomplish extraordinary things in the most humble of circumstances... let this be a poignant reminder as you reflect on the condition of your heart this Christmas season.

Humble Beginnings





Matthew 2:11

We find ourselves deeply immersed in the profound significance of the three gifts the wise men bestowed upon Jesus. The first gift, perfectly suited for a King, resonates powerfully within us. Today, we turn our hearts to the sacred gift of frankincense, a treasure fitting for a priest. Frankincense may seem distant in our modern lives. However, it carries a precious significance in Christ's existence. This is something we simply cannot overlook.

Frankincense is often lovingly referred to as olibanum. It is a captivating aromatic resin. This resin is drawn from the majestic trees of the genus *Boswellia*. They are part of the enchanting Burseraceae family. These ancient trees thrive in the sun-kissed arid landscapes of Africa and Asia. They grace countries like Somalia, Ethiopia, Oman, Yemen, India, and Eritrea. With reverent skill, harvesters carefully carve into the trunks. This allows the precious milky sap to flow forth. It gradually hardens into exquisite tear-shaped droplets. As these drops crystallize, they tell a story of nature's magic. When this revered resin is set ablaze, it releases an ethereal fragrance. This fragrance envelops us in its heavenly embrace.

The extraordinary nature of it linked it powerfully to sacred priestly activities. Incense, a divine offering, was burned with fervor as an intrinsic part of their sacred duties. In the hallowed spaces of the Tabernacle and temple, its fragrant plumes ascended. These plumes symbolized the heartfelt prayers of the people

reaching out to Him (Psalm 141:2). In the biblical era, sensory offerings were far more limited. We must remember this fact. The aroma of the incense stood out like a beacon among the mundane. God intended it this way, desiring to evoke something truly singular and unique in the hearts of His people.

God designed incense to be a powerful trigger. It reminded every Jewish man, woman, and child that their heartfelt prayers were ascending toward Him. The aromatic embrace of incense was not merely a scent. It served as a sacred bridge. The incense connected the faithful with their Divine Creator. That enticing fragrance signified a profound bond between heaven and earth, a reminder of their spiritual union. The sacred responsibility of the priests was to offer this sacred incense. They also carefully tended to it. This ensured that the divine connection remained alive and vibrant.

The wise men were boldly declaring that, in addition to being a King, Jesus is not merely a head priest. He is not even just the High Priest. He is the Highest Priest! The book of Hebrews reveals the profound depth of this truth. In ancient Israel, the High Priest was the vital link between God's people and God. He interceded for sinful souls to the Holy One. Yet, every High Priest was just a fallible man, constrained by time. No matter how dedicated they were, their ministry was destined to be temporary. They were always bound to be replaced.

But when Jesus died, rose, and ascended to heaven, He transformed into something profoundly unique. He became our eternal high priest, relentlessly interceding for humanity in the glorious presence of God Himself (Hebrews 7:25). Even now, over 2,000 years later, Jesus stands as the passionate mediator, representing God to mankind and mankind to God:

Frankincense symbolizes and foretells the magnificent role that Jesus embodies now and forever. It powerfully illustrates how Christ serves as the divine connector between humanity and God. As our intercessor, He doesn't serve for a fleeting moment, but eternally and unyieldingly. We are assured that our prayers ascend to the Father. This happens because of His unwavering commitment. They are cradled in the loving hands of the Highest Priest.

Highest Priest

Considering Jesus as the High Priest of believers ignites a passion within us that invites deep contemplation of our personal relationship with Him and God. Here are some thought-provoking questions and areas to fervently ponder:

1. Access to God

- How does Jesus' role as High Priest change access to God? The old covenant involved High Priests mediating for the people, offering sacrifices and entering the Holy of Holies on the Day of Atonement. • What comfort is there in knowing that Jesus is interceding for believers? He "always lives to make intercession" for those who draw near to God through


- him, according to Harvest Bible Chapel Des Moines. How does his ongoing advocacy affect the sense of security and assurance in faith?

Matthew 2:11

Jesus was bestowed with a magnificent gift of gold, a powerful symbol of His divine Kingship. Alongside this treasure, the wise men presented frankincense, acknowledging His exalted role as the Highest Priest. Yet, it is the gift of myrrh that captivates our hearts. This precious resin is harvested from the venerable *Commiphora* trees, particularly *Commiphora* myrrha. These trees thrive in the unforgiving landscapes of northeastern Africa and the Arabian Peninsula. Harvesting myrrh is a labor of love. Experts skillfully make incisions in the bark. This allows the aromatic sap to flow and crystallize. The resulting substance can be burned or preserved as a liquid. What makes myrrh distinct from frankincense are its remarkable medicinal properties. Its delightfully pleasant aroma invites us to appreciate its beauty and significance.

Myrrh, when blended with a rich liquid – often the finest wine because it was a very bitter substance – acts as a powerful sedative. It wraps those who partake in

its soothing embrace. Its application goes beyond mere healing. It lovingly cradles wounds. It also delicately graces corpses. It slows the inevitable march of decomposition with reverent care. This extraordinary gift shines brightly. It stands shoulder to shoulder with the treasures of gold and frankincense. This is a testament to its profound significance.

²² They brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means Place of the Skull). ²³ They tried to give him wine mixed with myrrh, but he did not take it.

Mark 15:22-23

As Jesus was being crucified, they tried to ease His suffering by offering Him a sedative by mixing myrrh and wine together, but He refused. He refused to lessen the severity of pain and punishment for our sin. It is not coincidence that this detail is given given as Jesus was suffering and dying on the cross. Yet, there's another mention of myrrh during this time we can not miss.

³⁸ After this, Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus – but secretly because of his fear of the Jews – asked Pilate that he might remove Jesus's body. Pilate gave him permission; so he came and took his body away. ³⁹ Nicodemus (who had previously come to him at night) also came, bringing a mixture of about seventy-five pounds of myrrh and aloes. ⁴⁰ They took Jesus's body and wrapped it in linen cloths with the fragrant spices, according to the burial custom of the Jews.

John 19:38-40 (Bold for emphasis)

Jesus was offered myrrh on the cross. His lifeless body was lovingly anointed with myrrh as He was laid to rest in the sacred tomb of Joseph of Arimathea. These poignant details are imbued with profound significance. God wants us to see myrrh at the cross. He also wants us to see myrrh at the tomb. This highlights myrrh's essential role in Jesus's death and burial narrative.

Now, let us transport ourselves back in time, to the very cradle of Christ's life! Can you sense the profound significance of this incredible gift? If gold symbolizes His Kingship and frankincense points to His divine priesthood, then what does myrrh reveal? It stunningly anticipates His suffering, foreshadowing the ultimate sacrifice He would make—our sacrificial lamb for our sins!

Even as a toddler, it was profoundly understood by God and the wise men that Jesus was destined to die for our sins. This truth reaches back even further! Before the dawn of creation, in the depths of His omniscience, God foresaw our sins and the desperate need for salvation. In the eternal dance of the Godhead, the Son emerged as our sacrificial lamb, slain before the very foundations of the world were laid (Revelation 13:8)!

So this made myrrh an appropriate gift.

We must take a heartfelt moment when we immerse ourselves in the Christmas story. We need to contemplate the significance of the wise men presenting myrrh to Jesus. This gift is a profound symbol, inviting us to reflect on its meaning. God bestowed the ultimate gift upon humanity. It was the very life of God's Son, who, in divine love, willingly sacrificed Himself on the cross. His sacrifice paved the way for our liberation from the grave weight of sin!


Sacrificial Lamb



This masterpiece comes with a mind-boggling price tag of \$12 million, although some sources dare to claim it costs \$16.7 million! This limited edition bassinet is not just a cradle; it is an enchanting mimicry of a mother's embrace, featuring a pod-shaped egg design perched upon a tall stand. The luxurious bedding is a sumptuous blend of silk, Pima cotton, and intricately embroidered gold yarn. With the option for dazzling customization involving diamonds and the finest white or pure gold, the already astronomical price climbs even higher. Other stunning examples I unearthed included:

- The Asnaghi Interiors It3001 Firenze Crib, hand-carved in Italy from solid beechwood with a hand-painted lacquer finish and silk upholstery, is priced at \$22,326.70.
- The Royal Round Luxury Velvet Baby Crib with Rhinestones is available for \$6,000.
- The Princess Tufted Crib in Blush Silk costs \$6,800.
- The King Tut Bed is priced at \$10,000.

When I was pregnant with my precious oldest daughter, I vividly recall the waves of concern surrounding SIDS (Sudden Infant Death Syndrome) that made headlines everywhere. The flood of information pouring in about cribs, blankets, and pajamas was truly overwhelming. As a first-time mom, my heart ached to provide the absolute best, yet my wallet often dictated my choices. Then, a miracle happened—my daughter's grandmother unearthed a stunning baby set at a garage sale, priced so modestly it felt like fate. It was absolutely perfect, sturdy, and provided the safety we craved. In fact, it became a beloved staple, lovingly used for my son as well.

If we, as ordinary people, can lovingly place our children's heads in a cozy crib, can you even fathom the magnificent cradle befitting a king? Not just any king, but the King of the universe! I dare say even a \$12 million dollar crib would pale in comparison for baby Jesus! And yet, He was not cradled in a golden cot, nor did He rest in a high-tech Intellicot. No, even the simplest Fisher Price or Ikea crib didn't grace His humble beginnings!

Instead, our Savior's head was tenderly laid in a humble manger. Most traditional manger scenes depict a charming little wooden bassinet, evoking warmth and nostalgia. We can easily envision cattle, donkeys, and sheep contentedly feeding from it. Yet, if we look back to biblical times, we discover a stark reality: the mangers were indeed rugged stone rectangular blocks resting upon a pair of cinder blocks. It wasn't the delicate wooden cradle we fantasize about today, but a solid stone block that cradled the King of Kings!

This is where the Creator of the universe and the Savior of the World spent His first night on earth, not in a lavish crib adorned with rhinestones and gold, but upon a cold, hard block of stone—used by animals to eat from, a stark reality. At that time, Caesar had decreed a census, demanding the participation of every Israelite, insisting they return to their ancestral homes for registration. Joseph's family hailed from Bethlehem, so Mary, burdened with the weight of impending motherhood, undertook the arduous journey. Upon their arrival, the crowds swarmed for the census, leaving no room for them to rest, except in a stable—or as some believe, a cave sheltering animals. From the humblest of women, to the most humblest of towns, in the most unassuming of places, the Lord was born and laid to rest each night in the humblest of "cribs."

But the should not suprise us. If we get to know Jesus, we find out that our Savior embodies and exemplifies humility! In Philippians 2:6-8 we read:

6 who, existing in the form of God, did not consider equality with God as something to be exploited.

7 Instead he emptied himself by assuming the form of a servant, taking on the likeness of humanity.

And when he had come as a man,

8 he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death—

even to death on a cross.

Philippians 2:6-8

- Resist the temptation to overspend, focusing instead on creating unforgettable experiences and sharing meaningful gifts that resonate.


• Remember, true contentment lies not in a picture-perfect holiday but in cherishing faith, love, and vibrant community.


What is wrong with shepherds?

- **Service projects:** Embrace the spirit of giving by volunteering with your family at a local soup kitchen, nursing home, or charitable organization, and bring hope to those in need.
- **Giving gifts:** Thoughtfully choose gifts that carry a spiritual message, like inspiring devotional books or beautiful ornaments adorned with Bible verses that will touch hearts forever.

3. Engage in thoughtful conversations

- **Ask questions and listen well:** This helps you understand others' perspectives and where they are spiritually.
- **Look for natural openings:** Inquire about their traditions, memories, and what's meaningful to them about the season.
- **Be prepared to share the story:** Explain the Gospel message clearly and concisely, focusing on God's love, our need for salvation, Christ's sacrifice, and the gift of eternal life through faith.
- **Use analogies related to the holidays:** Talk about the ultimate gift God gave in sending Jesus.
- **Share your personal story:** Testify to the difference Jesus has made in your life.


4. Pray faithfully

Immerse yourself in your faith. Seize every holiday opportunity with creativity. Engage in deep and meaningful conversations. Fervently rely on prayer. In doing so, you can transform this holiday season into a powerful moment. Countless individuals will hear and may even embrace the life-altering message of Jesus Christ.

Have you ever witnessed something amazing?

I was driving from Texas to Colorado in June of 2022. Texas has these non-native deer called Axis deer. They are much smaller than the native deer and they are easy to spot because they have spots. I missed my exit in the middle of nowhere and my gps re-routed me to take the next exit. No big deal, it would just add an extra few minutes to the drive. The road I was driving on gave roller coaster roads a whole new name. The sun was just barely up and all I saw were these axis deer, everywhere. I slowed down because they were making really bad choices and crossing the road ahead of me. One particular tall hill I came up over, on the other side I could see something small in the middle of it at the bottom. I came ta quick stop and my eyes focused on this barely hours old fawn crossing the road. This baby was so new to the world, it was wet. It was trying to hurry but its little hooves just weren't ready for that kind of hurry. Mama was just on the other side. When it got to the edge of the road, it was a bit steep and it stumbled and fell. At this point my heart ached for the little one to just be with mom. It got up, shook off and started crying for mom. You all! It never occurred to me that fawns make sounds. They sound similar to baby goats crying out for mom. The little one eventually tumbled over to its mom who at this point was in the trees. I actually got it all on video. My cell reception was terrible, but I stumbled upon a sleepy little town.

I decided to stop and use the amenities at the gas station. I couldn't wait to share what I witness with someone who I thought might find the same joy in the experience as I did. I sent them the video and texts of all the details.

When we experience something with great joy, our first instinct is to share it with others. We call, text, and make social media posts. Why? Because we want others to experience and share in our joy. It is why we take pictures at social occasions and events. To share and to remember.

In the Gospel of Luke, we read about one of the most amazing supernatural events, ever! And who did we learn witnessed it? A bunch of humble shepherds! Just try for a moment to imagine what all they saw! Fair warning tho: what you are imagining, does not even come close to the infinitely aw-inspiring scene that took place on the night of Jesus' birth!

Here is what we know: an angel of the Lord appeared and declared the Messiah had arrived. Then a whole host, and army of angels filled the sky and proclaimed:

¹⁴ Glory to God in the highest heaven, and peace on earth to people he favors!

Luke 2:14

The collective skill of Hollywood with all its AI and technology could never capture the majesty of this moment. One minute the shepherds were resting as they did every night and the next minute they are watching one of the most indescribably epic moments in history!

I'm going to do something I try hard not to do while writing. 'm going to rabbit trail. Why can we not describe our own encounter with God and the His Son or Holy Spirit? Have you ever noticed that? Have you ever tried to describe being in the presence of the Lord to others? Or have you ever encountered someone who has just had a life changing encounter and as they are trying to explain it, it does not seem to make sense? I do not know if this would hold up in the curt of the Lord, but I believe it is because we are using corrupted worldly speech to try and describe what is pure and Holy. There are no words to compare Him to. If I told you peace was like a slow rain that pitter patters on the roof (for example), you can imagine that situation. Maybe you do not like rain. Maybe your intellectual and trying to wrap your mind around what or how that is peaceful. Maybe your methodical and and can relate but it doesn't resonate. I believe we can not explain

it because eventually that rain stops. But God does not, so while the fleeting moment may reflect a sense of truth the actual reality is it can not encompass the Holiness of our Lord God.

Okay, back to our story, right now, as we reflect on the moment the shepherds we might think that it was the greatest moment ever. Nothing can top what they saw and heard, right? Let us look deeper.

God in the flesh. The creator of the universe, King of kings and Lord of lords....right before their very eyes!

They got to meet the Messiah! The got to worship at the feet of the Wonderful Counselor. They may have even gotten to hold in their arms the One who holds the universe together. There is literally nothing in history that can compare to this moment when God became man.

What did they do next?

¹⁷ After seeing them, they reported the message they were told about this child,

Luke 2:17

They went and told everyone who would listen!

"Hey!! The Messiah has come, we have seen Him! The angels told us where to go and I got to hold the Messiah! I was in the very presence of the Lord!"

But let us pause for a moment and think about this for a moment: These men got to see Jesus, but we have Jesus living within our very hearts. While they got to hold Him, we get to be held by Him.

Today everyone shares everything. We have become a society of over-sharers.

How about we let the Lord use this season as He did with the shepherds, to share the greatest news you have every received! Lets g out and tell the world the Gospel news with the same excitement and joy as we do the rest of our life!


1. Remember life before Jesus

Has a parent, sibling, or close friend ever utterly mortified you in front of others? Perhaps they unearthed an excruciatingly cringe-worthy childhood tale or showcased embarrassing home videos that made you wish to vanish into thin air. Maybe they even had an awkward conversation with a coach or instructor to try and push you onto the field or snag that coveted first chair position. Parents, in particular, are notorious for believing their child is a superstar deserving of the spotlight. Whatever the incident, it's likely that your loved ones have sacrificed your cool points for a few laughs. But fear not, you are most certainly not alone in this experience!

In Matthew 20, we read of a story that mirrors cringe. The mother of James and John cost them some major cool points with the other disciples.

²¹ "What do you want?" he asked her.

"Promise, she said to him, "that these two sons of mine may sit, one on your right and the other on your left, in your kingdom."

Matthew 20:21

Suffice to say, the other disciples were visibly furious over this audacious stunt. Yet, as embarrassing as it was, for these "sons of thunder," it marked a pivotal moment packed with a profound lesson. James and John were clearly yearning for greatness, passionate in their quest for authority and to be THE leaders. But Jesus, in His infinite wisdom, flips the script, shining a light on what true greatness looks like in His kingdom. He passionately reveals that what truly grants us authority as His disciples is not dominance, but the profound power of humble servanthood.

²⁶ It must not be like that among you. On the contrary, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, ²⁷ and whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave;

Matthew 20:26-27

Jesus even cites for them the greatest example of this being lived out: Himself.

Jesus arrived not like the tyrants who dominate the earth, lording it over the people and displaying their authority with arrogance (Matthew 20:25). Instead, He came to reveal that genuine leadership is a profound act of love and service. His ultimate expression of this service? The extraordinary sacrifice of His life as a ransom for us—paying the impossibly steep debt of death that we owed by dying in our stead. - Practice humility and gratitude: Recognize that your gifts and abilities are from God and meant to be used for His glory, not for personal gain or recognition.


2. Pumping lifeblood outwards (acts of service)

1 Timothy 1:15

Rescues are full of exciting, daring and chaotic narratives. One story in mind that was put to film is the story of Saving Private Ryan. It portrays Captain John miller and his ragtag group of soldiers who are tasked with going behind enemy lines to save Private James Ryan. Private Ryan was under orders to be removed and sent home because his three other brothers were killed. The rescue mission pulls us into a captivating tale involving a dynamic hero who would stop at nothing to save the victim from the nefarious antagonist.

What draws us to these types of stories? In an informational age of technology we are bombarded with in the moment stories of daring rescues on the high seas, after disastrous weather events, or even rescues of victims of unspeakable acts of violence. Why do we get so much satisfaction and joy in seeing someone rescued? Maybe it's the excitement and actions, but I think it is something more. I believe it is because as believers in Christ, we are living out the greatest rescue story of all time.

¹² Therefore, just as sin entered the world through one man, and death through sin, in this way death spread to all people, because all sinned

Romans 5:12

Romans 5:12 tells us that sin made its entry through one man and death was passed on to the whole race of humans. No one could break himself free from sin. In today's verse we learn that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners (1 Timothy 1:15). The Greek word Paul uses, sosai, means to deliver out of danger, to rescue from destruction, to bring into divine safety.

We are, as Paul claims, slaves to sin. Because of this every man is condemned and a hostage to death. There is a ransom over every single human's head.

²⁸ just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

Matthew 20:28

Jesus did not just come to serve, but to pay that ransom.

⁴ who gave himself for our sins to rescue us from this present evil age, according to the will of our God and Father.

Galatians 1:4

Our hero and Savior, Jesus Christ, came into the world for this very reason! Because He did this, we who believe in Him and receive Him:

¹⁷ If by the one man's trespass, death reigned through that one man, how much more will those who receive the overflow of grace and the gift of righteousness reign in life through the one man, Jesus Christ.

Romans 5:17

This is what makes this time of the year so wonderful!

But let us not miss something Paul says,

¹⁵ This saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance: "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners" — and I am the worst of them. ¹⁶ But I received mercy for this reason, so that in me, the worst of them, Christ Jesus

might demonstrate his extraordinary patience as an example to those who would believe in him for eternal life. ¹⁷ Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

¹⁸ Timothy, my son, I am giving you this instruction in keeping with the prophecies previously made about you, so that by recalling them you may fight the good fight, ¹⁹ having faith and a good conscience, which some have rejected and have shipwrecked the faith. ²⁰ Among them are Hymenaeus and Alexander, whom I have delivered to Satan, so that they may be taught not to blaspheme.

Each time I read these verses, I put myself in place of Paul. Instead of it saying Christ came to save sinners, of whom Paul was the worst, I read, "And Kimberlee is the worst of them all." I encourage you to do the same. Why? Because we are all equal in our sinfulness. None of us is righteous.

²³ For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God;

Romans 3:23

And if God saved Paul to use him so others could come to the faith, He can use me. He can use you!

The Christmas story is our story. It s the story of how we are rescued by Jesus from the clutches of death. We were guilty. Bu the Christmas story has the power to change the lives of ALL of mankind. Every person, no matter how far from grace thy have fallen, can be rescued! Is in need of rescue! WE should share it with everyone we meet. Not just at this time of the year but every day of the year.

Why?

Do you not want others to experience it, also?
