





According to God's Word, your actions reveal the condition of your heart, the authenticity of your faith, and whether you are truly following Jesus. While words may declare beliefs, consistent actions demonstrate who you are and who you are serving.

Your actions reveal the condition of your heart

Jesus taught that what a person does comes from their innermost being. Your behavior is a clear indicator of what is truly inside. Read the following verse.

• Matthew 12:34–35

Application: Righteous actions flow from a righteous heart, and sinful actions reveal an unrighteous heart. Instead of focusing on changing behavior, the Bible says to focus on changing the heart.

Your actions reveal the authenticity of your faith

The book of James emphasizes that true faith is demonstrated through actions. Faith without deeds is described as dead. The Bible poses the question of what good it is to claim faith but not help those in need, highlighting that actions towards others reveal the genuineness of one's faith.

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Your actions reveal who you serve

Your actions ultimately show who you are serving, whether it's God or your-self. Jesus stated that not everyone who calls Him "Lord" will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only those who do the will of His Father, warning those whose actions do not align with God's will to depart from Him. This indicates that true service to God is shown through actions, not just words.

Your actions reveal whether you love God

Love for God is demonstrated through obedience to His commands. Keeping His commands is presented as proof of love, signifying a heart given to God, which is reflected in one's actions.

God's Word teaches that your actions are a powerful indicator of your character, faith, and loyalties. It encourages genuine self-reflection and inner transformation so that your actions consistently reflect Christ's work within you.

How can I display holiness through the ordinary everyday life?

Living a holy life is not reserved for grand spiritual moments but is woven into the fabric of ordinary, everyday actions. Holiness, which means to be "set apart" for God's purposes, is a daily process of aligning your mind, actions, and relationships with His will. It is a reflection of God's character in your daily life.

Displaying holiness can be seen in three main areas of your life:

In your work

The Bible teaches that work is a holy calling when offered to God. This in-

volves:

- Working with excellence and integrity: Colossians 3:23–24 encourages working wholeheartedly as if serving the Lord. This dedication can serve as a positive example to others.
- **Having a servant's heart:** Treat colleagues and clients with humility and seek their best interests, reflecting Christ's example.
- Letting your light shine: Your behavior at work, such as kindness, patience, and handling frustrations with faith, can lead others to glorify God, as stated in Matthew 5:16.

In your relationships

How you treat others is seen as a reflection of your relationship with God. This includes:

- Showing love and compassion: Colossians 3:12 calls believers to exhibit compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. Jesus taught that selfless love, particularly towards fellow believers, would be a sign of discipleship (John 13:34–35).
- Controlling your speech: Guarding your tongue from negative talk like gossip or harsh words and using encouraging words is indicative of a holy heart. Ephesians 4:29 advises against unwholesome talk and promotes speech that builds others up.
- **Being a peacemaker:** Rather than causing conflict, someone pursuing holiness strives for unity and peace. Hebrews 12:14 emphasizes the importance of striving for peace and holiness.

Holiness also impacts your inner life, including your thoughts and habits:

- **Renewing your mind:** Transformation starts with renewing your mind, as instructed in Romans 12:2. This is achieved by engaging with God's Word daily.
- **Practicing discipline:** Pursuing holiness requires spiritual discipline, empowered by the Holy Spirit. This involves controlling thoughts, resisting temptation, and choosing righteousness even when alone.
- Cultivating gratitude: Giving thanks can glorify God in everyday moments. Thanking God for work, food, and circumstances acknowledges His presence throughout your day.



Despite not being Jesus' biological father, Joseph wholeheartedly embraced his role as an adoptive father, fully aware of the monumental divine destiny that lay before Jesus. When a 12-year-old Jesus was found in the temple, Joseph and Mary had been desperately searching for him, highlighting Joseph's deep concern and unwavering love (Luke 2:48). His boundless compassion and mercy for Mary echoed the incredible mercy that God would eventually extend to all of humanity.

Seeking and accepting God's unique calling for your life is a journey of surrender, trust, and intentional steps. It requires focusing on your relationship with God and aligning your desires and actions with His will, rather than waiting for a single dramatic revelation.

2. Use your gifts to serve others

Application: Seek chances to serve others with your gifts. This could be at church, in the community, or in the workplace. Serving others will offer greater clarity on how God wants to use you.

3. Stay open to change

Callings can shift throughout life. Current requests from God might change in the future. Be willing to move as God leads. Read the following verse.

• Isaiah 48:17

Application: Remain flexible and in constant communication with God. Trust that if you are walking closely with God, He will guide your steps, rather than being afraid of making the "wrong" decision.

4. Seek wise counsel

Discerning God's will does not need to be done in isolation. God often uses wise, godly people to help affirm and clarify a calling. Read the following verse.

Proverbs 11:14

Application: Seek advice from trusted spiritual mentors, pastors, or mature Christians who can offer insight and prayerful support while you seek to live out God's will





Drawing inspiration from the remarkable life of Joseph, the devoted earthly father of Jesus, here are compelling journal prompts designed to deeply reflect on his extraordinary character and powerfully apply his profound example to your own life.

On obedience and trust

Matthew 1:20–24: An angel came to Joseph in a dream telling him to take Mary as his wife. Joseph, a righteous man, had been considering divorcing her quietly, but he obeyed God immediately.

Luke 2:41–51: Joseph consistently provided for his family's spiritual well-being by taking them to Jerusalem for Passover each year.

Prompt: What traditions or practices are you implementing in your life to provide spiritual guidance for those around you? What is one new spiritual practice you could start to model the importance of faith to your



family or community?


On humility and faith
