After Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of King Herod, wise men from the east arrived in Jerusalem,² saying, “Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star at its rising and have come to worship him.”

³ When King Herod heard this, he was deeply disturbed, and all Jerusalem with him. ⁴ So he assembled all the chief priests and scribes of the people and asked them where the Messiah would be born.

⁵ “In Bethlehem of Judea,” they told him, “because this is what was written by the prophet:

⁶ **And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah: Because out of you will come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel.”**

⁷ Then Herod secretly summoned the wise men and asked them the exact time the star appeared. ⁸ He sent them to Bethlehem and said, “Go and search carefully for the child. When you find him, report back to me so that I too can go and worship him.”^[c]

⁹ After hearing the king, they went on their way. And there it was—the star they had seen at its rising. It led them until it

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came and stopped above the place where the child was. ¹⁰ When they saw the star, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹ Entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and falling to their knees, they worshiped him. ^[d] Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹² And being warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, they returned to their own country by another route.

Matthew 2:1-12

1. Intentionally seek Jesus

Scripture guide:

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sincere worship



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The worship of the wise men radiated sincerity, born from a fervent, sacrificial quest for truth, and bursting forth with deep reverence upon discovering Jesus – not amid the grandeur of a palace, but in the simplicity of a humble home. Their profound example ignites a fire within us, urging our own worship to be intentional and passionate, rather than mere routine or swayed by superficial appearances. They offered not just lip service, but extravagant gifts – a king's gold, the divine frankincense, and myrrh steeped in the shadow of death – illustrating that authentic worship demands our utmost, not our scraps. By kneeling before a child they barely knew, they demonstrated that true worship is an act of humble surrender to Jesus's kingship, regardless of how unconventional or contradictory to our expectations his presence may appear. The authenticity of their worship, embodied in action, sacrifice, and profound reverence, stands as a stirring reminder to approach our moments with God with a focused heart, boldly acknowledging his worthiness to receive our most treasured gifts and our full submission.

They modeled sincere worship

- **Recognition:** Upon finding Jesus, described as a "child" in a "house," the Magi "fell down and worshiped him" (Matthew 2:11, NIV). They humbled themselves before a baby who was not yet in a position of earthly power.

Their extravagant journey and genuine awe serve as a vibrant model for modern Christians, urging us to transcend casual or routine faith. Sincere worship, as revealed in scripture, is not merely an emotion you muster but a dynamic posture of the heart and a lifestyle infused with intentionality.

Worship with intentionality, not convenience

As learned, non-Jewish men hailing from the East – most likely Persia or Babylon – their pilgrimage to seek and honor the "king of the Jews" reveals an extraordinary truth: God's divine plan was never meant for just one nation but has always been a magnificent call inviting people from "all nations" to come to Him. Their arrival fulfilled ancient prophecies, such as Isaiah 60:3, which foretold that Gentiles would come to bask in God's light, bringing with them treasures of gold and incense.
